 SUBJECT: **LENTREMY, Rono**

The following is derived from the SCI Interrogation of LENTREMY (See SCI Report No. S-249 for ST Interrogation of subject). The SCI Interrogation differs from that of the ST in that the questioning was centered on LENTREMY's mission to kill JIGGER:

LENTREMY was born on 12 June 1923 at Laventie (Pas de Calais); he is single; a slater ("couvreur") by trade. In June of 44 he was out of work in Lille and went to the Kommandatur there to ask for employment of any sort. He was taken on by the Germans and sent to Reims, where he joined a group headed by Capt. HAGEN, a German. During his stay in Rheims he says that he informed the Germans of the existence of a resistance group so large that they refused to believe for several days. When they did raid the house pointed out by subject, they found that the French had been warned and escaped; only two men were arrested.

HAGEN was impressed by this evidence of subject's willingness to cooperate and promised to give him a job. The abortive raid occurred about July 21, and shortly after that HAGEN left for Paris with one Henri DUGUET (see report S-375 on DUGUET). Subject later learned that this mission was for the purpose of contacting JIGGER.

The group of which LENTREMY was a member left Rheims late in July, and about the middle of August they found themselves somewhere in Luxembourg, where HAGEN joined them. According to subject, HAGEN said he was unable to find JIGGER, that he thought he had been taken prisoner by the FFI near MAUX. Prisoner was questioned very closely about the time this arrest is supposed to have taken place, and he sticks to his story that it was between 21 July and the middle of August.

Later HAGEN told LENTREMY he had a mission for him - to go to Paris, find JIGGER and kill him. HAGEN reported that JIGGER had been a Gestapo chief who had probably gone to the Americans, taking his records with him, in order to betray his fellow Germans. Another Frenchman, SENECHAL, was to accompany subject on his mission, but subject was the chief.

When he asked where he was to find his victim, subject was given a photograph of JIGGER and one of his mistress, and was told where the mistress had been living when last known. He was also given the names of ALIESSANDRI (ALESSANDRI) and a number of other gangsters who

... had been among JIGGER's men, with instructions to contact any one of them for information concerning JIGGER's whereabouts. Several Corsican hangouts were also listed. LENTREMY and SENECHAL were each given 100,000 francs, and promised more if they were successful. Proof that they had fulfilled their mission was to consist in bringing back JIGGER's French identity card and papers. They were told to reach the German lines, and use the phrase "COMMIT. IC" as password. He would then be brought to the competent military authorities who would see that he reached Captain HAGEN.

LENTREMY came to Paris early in October. He telephoned to the address of JIGGER's mistress, but was told she had gone and he did not know where she was. He visited the cafe "Au Grand Duc" Place Pigalle, Montmartre, where the patron said he knew JIGGER but had no idea where he was. After three or four days of this sort of search, subject abandoned his mission and proceeded to enjoy himself in the night clubs with his 100,000 francs.

When his money was gone, he travelled north and sold his pistol, eventually returning to Paris in November, where he was arrested on the denunciation of someone who reported he was a member of the "Milice". He insists he had no more definite contacts in Paris than those furnished him by HAGEN - a list of JIGGER's known haunts and former associates figuring largely among them:
