He therefore came under the surveillance of the SS-Fuhrungshauptamt, who brought him to the notice of SCHELLENBERG as he seemed suitable for work with Amt VI, and it was decided to employ him on Int work in the South of France and Monaco. Gestapo investigations, however, led to his being suspected of Bolshevist tendencies, and as a result of this SCHELLENBERG regarded him as being unreliable and declined to sanction the mission.
