We would also appreciate any information later than 1953 which MLB files contain, in view of Subject's former connection with ZIPPER. Traces are not solicited from other addressees unless Subject is known to Vienna or Bonn Station personnel.

Since I am dealing with so far completely unknown factors regarding my future official employment, I consider it fair to make the following suggestions:

No ties should exist between the Organization that I have served so far and myself until such time when security and fertility of my future work allow a reestablishment. The reasons are:

- a. I will endeavor to obtain as important a position as possible either in the German Foreign Service or with the Amt fuer Verhassungsschutz. I myself prefer the Foreign Service.
- b. Whether and when this is possible cannot be predicted.
- Even when this target should be reached, it is probable that I will be under German surveillance for some time. If found out, my work for the United States could cause embarrassment.

I therefore feel that I should propose a separation for the time being. I would suggest that I be given an address which I could contact when conditions develop the way I hope they will. I finally want to confirm my unswerving faith in the United States and my willingness to work for the U. S. Government at any time.

At the time the Germans had to leave Austria, i.e., at the end of 1945, subject moved to PRIEN/Chiemsee, and later on to MUNICH, but returned to SALZBURG in March 1948. She held no position between April 1945 and March 1948.
