SUBJECT: Results of Scanning of Catalogues of the New York Public Library

1. Unfortunately, the answers to all major questions which you ordered me to check upon are negative.

- a) The "REYNOLD'S NEWS!" The wanted copy with the article "Britains Secret Rulers," is not stored.
- b) "The WEEK". The wanted copy with the article "The Clivedon Set" of October or November 1937 is not stored.
- c) The "PRAVDA" of 18 January 1928 is available under the "Class Mark" for all microfilms of "Pravda": *ZAN - *Q-17. The year and month must be indicated when ordering a roll of the film.
I scanned this number of Pravda but did not find there anything of special interest for our purposes as far as I know those.
- d) The Telephone Directories of London for the years 1933 through 1936 are available and were checked. There were no entries of any telephone being registered under the name of RABINOWITZ, Hermina, Gerta or Herta.
I checked also the similar names, like RABBINOWITZ; RABINOVICH, RABINOWICH, RABINOVITCH, RABINOWITCH and the similar variations of RUBINOWITZ, and also RABINOWITS.

The closest to the looked-for name I found being RABINOWITZ, E. if this E could be taken for Ermina as a variation for Hermina. The address of this person was given as 13 Hillside rd N.15, and the telephone # STAmfd H1 2816. *only in May + Nov 1934*

Another possibility could be: RABINOVICH, H. Tobacco, 85 Cannon St. rd E 1, telephone # ROYal 5289. In book of 1933.

A third variation: RABINOVITZ H, Furrier, 2 Redcross St. E.C.1. Telephone # NAtional 2710. In book of 1933, also May 1934.

- 2) Other information which I found during this very quick and insufficient scanning is described on the attached 14 pages.
- 3) I found and bought photocopies of the three missing pages of the weekly "DIE WELTWOCH" of 1963 article "Glanz und Elend der Geheimdienste" (Brilliance and Misery of the Secret Services) by Joachim JOESTEN. Expenses involved: \$ 1.--.

THE RESULTS OF SCANNING THE CATALOGUES OF THE NEW YORK
PUBLIC LIBRARY during the week of 15 to 19 March 1971.

1. "REYNOLDS NEWS" is the true name of the weekly newspaper which was sought. In the catalogue the name is given under "REYNOLD'S NEWS. Incomplete collections dating to 1940, 1941 and 1942, losely in two folders, are available. The paper is very brittle and pieces torn up. The stock does not reach back as far as to February 1928, which was wanted.

The folder of 1940 - 1941 was scanned. The paper carries the slogan "Government Of the People, By the People, For the People," beneath its name on the front page. Although this slogan is of American origin, it seems to be closer to the Communist slogan "Workers of the World, Unite!" than to the original meaning of it, as is reflected by the majority of the articles published in this paper.

There were no articles of particular interest. Of some interest could be

Dec. 15, 1940, p. 5: "Postcard was War Chief's Death Warrant." Vladimir STRELTZOFF, Captain in the General Staff of the Austro-Hungarian Army in 1916 writes about mail censorship in 1916, when a postcard which was read by a censor simply because it had happened misplaced into a wrong mail bag, gave a hint of the imminent sinking of the warship "Hampshire" with Lord KITCHENER on board of it. It does not give much information.

Dec. 22, 1940, p. 1: "British Spy Hidden in U.S. Embassy" in Paris. The Germans requested the recall of: Mrs DEEGAN, a clerk who was arrested by the Germans for having helped an escaped PoW, a British officer; the Secretaries Mr. Cecil CROSS and Mr. Lee HUNT who helped a British Intelligence Service man to hide in the Embassy.

Same issue, p. 4: "Blonde Sirens are not Good Spies." A German agent, Mrs. Dorothy O'GRADY, has been caught and sentenced to death. In this connection some old spy stories are recalled: The "Canteen Ma" of the British Secret Service Romany RONDELL (WW I); "The Woman of Antwerp" from Munich; Mata Hari, and also "the blond countess - Madame Maria de Victoria" who was sent to the U.S.A. in 1917. No particulars about those cases are given. On behalf of Mrs. Dorothy Pamela O'GRADY an appeal was made as mentioned in the issue of 29 Dec., p. 3.

Dec. 29, 1940, p. 4: Harold IASKI writes an article "We Are Not Fighting to Preserve the Old Order."

Soviet-German political relations as news items:

June 15, 1941, p. 1: "Soviets Divided Over Nazi Demand for Aid."
" " p. 4: "Who Will Reap the Ukrainian Harvest? Germans look East."

June 22, 1941, p. 1: "Soviets Give Rebuff to Hitler." DEKANOSOV is mentioned having said that there should be no more talks until the German forces now massed at the Russian frontiers are withdrawn or considerably reduced.

Readers' Opinions:

Dec. 22, 1940, p. 2: "Soviet Apologists." by L.C. ALPE, New Malden, England. ... "Does your correspondent Andrew ROTHSTEIN really ask us to believe that the Governments of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania were plotting against the USSR? He obviously has great faith in our simplicity.

ROTHSTEIN and those who think with him, have the constant task these days of attempting to explain away Russia's actions, but much as they can convince themselves of the righteousness of every deed of Stalin, the reminder of us find it difficult to resist a growing scepticism."

H.P. McCARTHY writes from Cardiff: "... I venture to predict that Great Britain and Russia could steer Europe to sanity."

Dec. 29, 1940, p. 1: "Talks Resumed with Russia." Mr. Anthony EDEN says about his talks with Mr. MAISKY: "... I understand that many questions of common interest to the two countries were covered during the talk. Mr. MAISKY reaffirmed his Government's desire for legal recognition of the decision of the Baltic States to join the Soviet Union.... "

Same issue, p. 2: "Anti Soviet Lies." Andrew ROTHSTEIN answers to Mr. ALPE. "... as for Fascist regimes in Latvia and Lithuania and the military dictatorship in Estonia, their anti-Soviet activities were conducted not only on their own puny accounts of course, but on behalf of more powerful patrons, where espionage services notoriously used these States as a base of operations."

2. The weekly newspaper THE WEEK.

No copies are available from 1937 where an article about the Cliveden Set could be found.

In the copy # 285 of Oct.12,1938, p.5, the article "LINDBERGH" speaks of a conversation which Colonel Lindbergh had with Mr. Lloyd George after Lindbergh had returned from his visit to Russia. When Lindbergh had given his analysis of the air strength of various countries, Mr. Lloyd George had asked the Colonel whether the latter discussed this matter with Marshal VOROSHILOV. The Colonel shall have answered, "No. Voroshilov? Who is Voroshilov anyway?" According to the article Mr. Lloyd George excused himself "soon afterwards", - he had no more time for the Colonel.

There it is said that Lindbergh is strongly denying that he ever said that he had been offered the post of "head of the Soviet Civil aviation administration", and that he has not dined with Lady ASTOR since he returned from Russia.

In the copy # 286 of Oct.19,1938, p. 5, is a short article "LINDBERGH" which is brought in full here: "As a result of THE WEEK's disclosures of Colonel Lindbergh's goings on at the Clivedenite lunch, people accustomed to receive invitations to those weekly lunches have been informed that it will be impossible to continue with the lunches at all unless everything said over the table is regarded as strictly confidential."

NOTE: According to Joachim JOESTEN's article "Glanz und Elend der Geheimdienste" (Brilliance and Misery of the Secret Services) in the weekly DIE WELTWOCHEN, Zürich, of 26 July 1963, the Cliveden castle of Lord ASTOR and a landhouse belonging to this castle were the places where the British Minister of War PORFUMO met Christine KEELER and others, Porfumo being a guest of Lord Astor. This was in July 1961.

In the issue # 332 of July 5,1939,p.5 in the article "The Cabinet" the "Cliveden Set" appears in one sentence: ... "the remnants of the non-existing Cliveden Set with Lord LOTHIAN as Commander - in - Chief"....

This newspaper carries many quite interesting political articles and news, like: "Herr SCHMIDT" in # 317 of Jun 1,1939, p 5-6. Herr SCHMIDT was an employee of the Austrian Legation in Bucharest before the invasion of Austria. He managed to stay in service after the invasion and had an important role in the development of the German-Rumanian trade agreement. However, his secret pro-Rumanian attitude became known to the Germans and he was called to Mrs. OPPENHEIM, an important official of the German Secret Service, and Herr Schmidt had to shoot himself.

"The Battle for France" in # 324 of 19 July 1939, p 4-6. Subtitles like: Far bigger than STAVISKY affaire; AUBIN and POITIER arrested as Nazi agents in France. The General Staff against the Nazi supporters; Elizabeth BUTTER fled to Germany; BONNET's activities in connection with the STAVISKY scandal are well known to the Nazis; Herr BAUER, Gestapo agent arrested ; HIRSCH a Gestapo agent.

"The Premier and the Generals" in # 332 of 5 July 1939, p.1-2. This is about the secret visit of two German generals to the British Prime Minister on the ~~weekend~~ "last weekend". There is some more of the a/m OPPENHEIM.

In the issue of 18 Jan 1928 I did not find anything of special importance. On p.2 the Vice-Chairman of the American Federation of Labor Mr. UOLL (probably WALL) brings a letter to Mr. SHLEY, the Chairman of the Russo-American Chamber (Palata). It contains attacks against the USSR and asks that the communist activities be stopped in the U.S.A.

On p.5: "Explosion in Dorogomilov" is being remembered on its tenth anniversary. Some 50 people were killed when the HQ and the Arsenal of the Red Guard were blown up by the whites. Four names are mentioned.

Under Chronicle two appointments are announced: Dmitriy Ivanovich KURSKIY to be the plenipotentiary representative in Italy, and N.M.YANSON to be the Peoples Commissar of Justice of the RFSSR.

In the issue of 17 Jan 1928 on p.2 B.NILOV writes "Parizhskim Sudyam v Pomoshch" (To Help the Paris Judges.) This is about a forgery process against the people who had forged different Soviet documents and the signatures of some members of the Soviet Embassy in Paris. Some names are given.

Some more about the same process is brought in the issue of 21 Jan, p.6: "Protsess Fabrikantov Antisovetskikh Fal'shivok" (Process against the Manufacturers of the Antisoviet Falsifications.)
