(U//FOUO) acknowledged his degree was not accredited, but did not acknowledge it was not a valid degree, despite being presented evidence to the contrary. initially removed the (b)(3) CIAAct (b)(6)degree from his Agency BIO after his interview with OIG. He (b)(7)(c)subsequently reinstated it and stated his desire that a: ... request be made in writing, on letterhead, include references, if not actual copies, of the Agency regulations and/or policies you believe my non-compliance would put me in conflict with, and whatever provisions have been made for appeal, if appropriate. **DISPOSITION:** (b)(6)(b)(7)(c)was never an accredited institution and never (b)(6) 24.
