The Agency BIO is made available to hiring managers and used directly in staffing decisions. Only staff employees and former employees were covered by this review because there is no central database on contractor educational records.

Students would receive extensive credit for transferred courses as well as extensive "life experience" credit. Students would register for a small number of classes and were asked to purchase and read textbooks for the classes. Students would then submit a paper based on the class topic for grading. For classes taken at the university, students would pay an enrollment fee for each class, and then a separate grading fee for each paper submitted. Since there were no faculty behind the classes, student submissions varied greatly in quality. There was no valid check of the academic work performed.
