Dr. Wilhelm Voss, Leader of German Military Experts, Talks About Hisself and Egypt.

Through a mutual friend of Dr. Wilhelm Voss and an officer of the Embassy, Voss suggested a quiet meeting outside the Embassy to setablish contact and exchange views. (Two officers of the Embassy met with him. A memorandum concerning vosu and the views he expressed is enclosed.

It is believed Yoss may have made this approach as a form of insurance since a settlement of the Anglo-Egyptian dispute might leave the German experts out on a limb. Similarly, the collapse of the present regime might make their future prospects for remaining in Egypt exceedingly doubtful.

Your may also have had in mind laying wires for the future participations of German experts in maintenance of the Sues base if and when a settlement is reached.

Regardless of his motives, it seems clear that Your is out comete German interests and more specifically his own interosts shows nowe of other Gerans in Egypt.

On the question of his own political sentiments, Yoss brought up the fact that there are rumors circulating to the effect that he is a Communist. He remarked that this was obviously impossible since the Russians were responsible for the loss of his wife and two sons during the war.

As to his position vis-a-vie the other German experts, Your made it clear that he is the directing head of the group.

Voss obviously likes Egypt and wants to stay here. On this point he remarked that it was "a good thing to stay out of Europe for a while."
