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INTRODUCTORY NOTE

1. No Economic Information Obtained.

Late in December 45 WIRSING transferred to DUSTBIN for examination by the Office of U.S. Political Advisor, after he had been interrogated by CIC and 3 AG for seven months. As the Political Advisor was engaged on other urgent work he was detained at [redacted] for interrogation by the undersigned upon his return. [redacted] It was hoped that WIRSING could supply information on economic plans for the post-war period but so far he has denied any activity or any knowledge of such plans in that field. It is, however, felt that he must have gathered much material for such plans through his journalistic investigations all over Europe before and during this war. (Paras 15-54) His last political and philosophical publication includes economic problems (Paras 108-109).

2. Reasons for Arrest and Obscurity.

He claims to have worked toward HITLER's abdication or dismissal, but actually, he attempted to have HIMMLER replace HITLER. It is of utmost importance that SS Stubaf WIRSING be interned for a long time both as an automatic arrest and as a security threat."

5. The under [redacted] fully to these statements after two brief interviews [redacted] for a hasty perusal of his last book, published [redacted] 107-109). Not only did he suggest replacing HIMMLER by HIMMLER, but later he dropped HIMMLER and tried to have first BRUNING, then SCHWERIN-KROSZIG take control of the new, post-war German Government, reserving for himself, at the age of 38, the modest post of general political advisor to the Foreign Office.

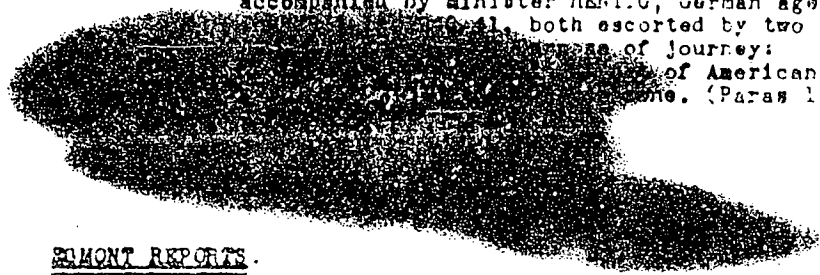

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ARDENNES had begun, and not in May, as Otto OHLENDORF had stated. WIRSING claims that the breakdown of the negotiations is attributable to the loss of this battle. He also claims to have warned HIMMLER and others through SCHELLENBERG, as soon as he heard that such a battle was being planned, that it should not be undertaken unless the German Staff were certain of overwhelming success. Staff were certain of or ended merely a tactical success. EISENHOWER would be in a position to take advantage of the time of negotiations with the Allies in 1944, particularly favourable as soon as the Allies had reached the west and that the war, due to the efficient German resistance, might be protracted for years.
