How do you like life in Uncle Sam's navy? Not so hot, huh?
 Well at least you're stuck in the Baltic and not in Vietnam. But I suppose you've got buddies over there or maybe have been there yourself. You guys with long tours left could expect to be sent there any time between now and ETO.

Not a very pleasant thought, is it? I guess you feel you're in a bind and are powerless to do anything about it, but that's where you're wrong! Guys in the service can, and are doing something about it.

In fact, American servicemen have a long history of doing something about it when the brass have tried to fuck them over. Did you know that after World War II the brass, the Government and big business wanted to invade China. But the guys in the Pacific had been fighting for four years and they were sick and tired of war so THEY REFUSED: they held strikes and mass demonstrations demanding to be sent home and the brass and the Government had no choice against sub-class resistance but to send them home. The GIs and sailors were able to do this because they were organised. This type of action has long been used by the working class, whether in uniform or out of it. The Government and the ruling class of big business have always tried to keep the working class down as far as they could push them. After all, the less you pay workers, the more profit you make. It was always a question of power, but the REAL POWER lies with the working class. They run the machines, they keep production moving and they have the power to SHUT THINGS DOWN: This is the strongest weapon the working class has. But it is no good unless it is organised.

The armed forces has always been used as a weapon against the working class. It is used to suppress riots in the cities and to break up strikes in the factories. Working class guys have always stood at one end of the bayonet or the other. Now in Vietnam, working class guys are being sent 10 000 miles away from home to fight, and if necessary, to die in a war in which they have NO INTEREST! But the working class in uniform has the same weapon at their disposal. They keep thing going and they can SHUT THINGS DOWN. Since the Vietnam war blew up, the soldiers and the sailors have refused to go along with it passively. It started on a small scale with individual desertions and individual refusal of orders. The American Serviceman's



scored: The Department of Defense has issued a directive to all unit commanders that they are to leave hands off underground newspapers and all article 15's are to be issued only AFTER CHECKING WITH HIGHER AUTHORITIES, the Government is giving a little more freedom in the hope that the trouble will stop. But it is only the beginning. The Government knows and the brass knows that the real power lies in the hands of the GIs and sailors themselves, just like out in the world, in the factories and work shops the real power lies in the hands of the people who are running the machines and not in the hands of the bosses. The thing to do now is to let the GIs and the sailors know that they have the power and to get them to USE IT! More underground newspapers have to be started and spread, mass resistance has to be organised and the Front International, the International Organization of GIs is there to help guys to get things organised, to let them know how to organize and to keep them informed about what other guys are doing to fight the War and the system. There are branches of the SPI in Canada, France and Sweden. The ~~American~~ ~~Deserters' Committee in Sweden~~ is part of the ~~Second~~ Front International. There is a lot of work to be done and IT HAS GOT TO BE DONE NOW!

That's not an order, that's a NECESSITY!

So write and let us know where you are at. We'll send you a copy of the Second Front Review, the international GI magazine and try to advise you on any question as to what you can do to stop the war in Vietnam and to take U.S. away from Pentagon, U.S. Steel and General Motors and put it back in the hands of the working class. Let us hear from you!

This is a final response to your 30 March 1984 Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request concerning the American Committee to Free Tibet, the Spanish Vietnam Committee, the Spanish Front for National Liberation, the Socialist-Left Front Committee (SLA), the Japanese Group de Seine, and the Soviet-Vietnam Friendship Committee. Your request was processed in accordance with the FOIA, 5 U.S.C. 552, and the CIA Information Act, 50 U.S.C. 431. Our processing included a search for records in existence as of and through the date of our acceptance letter, 20 August 1986.

We have examined those Agency systems that might contain information regarding your request and find that we are unable to identify any information or record filed by [REDACTED] under the six specific subjects of your request. Also, we are unable to calculate the fees involved in this request.

During the course of its search for documents in response to your FOIA request concerning the American Committee to Free Tibet, the Federal Bureau of Investigation located 72 documents originated by this agency and referred them to us for review and direct response to you.

We have reviewed the documents and our determinations are as follows:

Enclosed, copy A, are copies of acceptable portions of [REDACTED] 1974-1975, originating from 4 March 1975 through 23 October 1976. Portions from the originals were made under the (b)(1) and (b)(7D) exemptions of the FOIA. Additional deletions were made by the FBI in accordance with the (b)(2) and (b)(7)(C) deletions and in accordance with 5 U.S.C. 552(e). A copy of the FOIA exemption is enclosed at 105-B.
