Two privatizations carried out under Macedonia's former leadership, the Internal Macedonian Revolutionary Organization-Democratic Party for Macedonian National Unity (VMRO-DPMNE) have come under criticism for alleged rampant corruption. Macedonia's Constitutional Court annulled on 11 December the 1999 parliamentary ratification of a deal with Greece's Hellenic Petroleum for a 54 percent share in Macedonia's Okta refinery, according to the press, because the deal granted Hellenic a monopoly of Macedonia's oil market.
